

Pat Gotch

There was once a girl named Patricia Eleanor Boyle. You all know her by Pat Gotch as she married Dan Gotch on July 18, 1971; hence the name change. Pat had a happy childhood growing up in Minneapolis/St. Paul, MN and was somewhat of a tomboy. She loved riding her bike with friend, John Hoyt, and swimming and climbing trees. In high school, she was involved in many varying activities, including Library Club, and the Girls Athletic Association. She was voted the "best well rounded" by her classmates when she was a junior.

Pat went on to attend the U of MN. After the completion of each college school year, she traveled to far off places! After freshman year, it was working in a snack shop at Glacier National Park, after sophomore year, hitchhiking to many countries in Europe with 3 friends, after junior year working as a waitress in Lake George, NY. And of course, there were a few cool guys along the way!

She graduated in June, 1966 with a BA in Sociology and Music, again packed her bags and went to study Italian in Perugia, Italy. She has relatives in Italy whom she met and stayed with in Milan for a time. It was a very rich, maturing experience for her, and a trip she thought was indefinite turned out to be just 6 months. She was so happy to make it back home for Christmas. Pat will never forget her family and friends were there to meet her at the airport!

After all those travels, it was time to get a "real" job, and move into an apartment with two good friends. She worked in the black ghetto of St. Paul, MN as personnel director of a community action project which was part of Lyndon Johnson's War on Poverty. Funds ran out for the Personnel Directors job, so she packed up a few boxes of her belongings in her little white Valiant, and with her good friend, Barbara, drove cross country to San Francisco, CA. She lived with her friend Maggie who lived in the Haight Asbury. This was 1968. You have heard of the flower children, and the hippies. Well ... It was a bit of a culture shock for Pat to be in CA, but as you know, she survived, went on to the University of SF for her teaching credential, married Dan, followed him to Arcata, CA while he completed his MFA in performing arts.

Pat and Dan lived in Santa Fe, NM the second year of their marriage where Pat taught 4th, 5th and 6th grade for several years in a new school. The teachers worked cooperatively in a no walls situation. The school was a huge pod!

Their son, Tim, was born in Santa Fe in 1973.

In 1976, they moved to the Monterey Peninsula where they have remained all these years .Pat worked as an elementary school teacher, mainly at Monte Vista Elementary School, and was fortunate to work with wonderful teachers. Early on, she worked to help develop the performing arts program at Monte Vista. Every year, the classes would perform a musical. Often, the plays were adaptations of a book the class had worked on. One such adaptation was the Quiltmaker's Gift by Jeff Brumbeau. It was a wonderful time to be teaching .

Pat's daughter, Katie, was born in Soquel, CA in 1977, and now lives in Portland as a clinical therapist. Tim is in So. SF and works at UC Berkeley as an Educational Technology consultant. Pat and Dan have one grandson.

Pat still loves to travel, especially adventure travel. She has been to Ecuador, Peru, the Galapagos Islands, Africa, Thailand, and countries in Europe. Since retirement, she has learned to knit and play golf, is a volunteer at the Monterey Bay Aquarium, belongs to the Association of American Women, and is a RIF coordinator for King Elementary. My parents lived in Lompoc, California, but there were no hospitals there at the time, so I was born in Santa Maria, California on July 4, 1938. We lived in Lompoc where my father owned a service station. When the war broke out, we left our home and business and moved more inland to the Fresno area, away from the coast. We were then loaded on a train to be evacuated to Poston, Arizona. We were interned in a barracks away from civilization until we were able to move to St. Paul, Minnesota. There my father had a job fixing radiators for army jeeps and my mother taught Japanese at Ft. Snelling to the soldiers. We stayed in St. Paul until we moved back to California. I was in third grade and attended Bay View School and later Walter Colton and Monterey High School. Later I transferred to Pacific Grove High School. I attended San Jose State College where I graduated with my Elementary and Early Childhood Education credentials. While I was at SJS, I was active in Kappa Phi (Methodist Group), Delta Phi Epsilon (Early Childhood Group), and later Black Masque (an honorary senior women's group). After graduation I taught in the Campbell School District.

In 1960 I married Bob in the SJS Chapel. We lived in San Jose and our first son, Kris, was born in 1962 and Glenn was born in 1964. In 1969 Bob was transferred with NYLife to Reno, Nevada where we lived until 1974. I did some substitute work there. In 1974 we decided to move to Monterey because my parents had cancer. We wanted to be closer to them so they could enjoy their grandsons. My mother enjoyed going to all the sports games that the boys participated in. At that time, I was active in our church as teacher and superintendent. I also did some sub work at Monte Vista School, and I decided to go back to work. I was teacher over the ratio at Del Monte School and later began teaching at Monte Vista where I taught second and third grades. I was on staff there until I retired in 2004 after teaching school a little over 28 years.

Since retirement, I have enjoyed traveling, teaching, going to Bible Study and spending time with family and friends. I have three grand children. Our oldest is working on a Doctorate at MGH Institute of Health Professionals in Physical Therapy. One granddaughter is at JC in Hospitality and our youngest is ready to graduate high school and then go off to college.

I have been on our DKG Board and been active in RIF. I have enjoyed being a part of such a neat group of ladies.

Two Delta Lambda Nominees Selected

Each year Chi State selects a number of first, second, and third year teacher applicants to receive a Penne Ferrell monetary award to finance the cost of book, e-books, or other reading materials intended for a classroom library or to supplement curriculum.

A bequest to Chi State from the estate of Penne Ferrell was the basis for the establishment of this award. Penne was an outstanding member of Epsilon Omicron Chapter in Orange County. A dedicated teacher and lover of books, Penne instilled the joy of teaching in the many new teachers she mentored, always encouraging enthusiasm in being an educator.

Due to a recent generous bequest to the Penne Ferrell fund, Chi State was able to award 57 out of 62 applications. Thirty eight first year teachers were awarded \$200.00 each, and 19 second and third year teachers were awarded \$150.00 each.

Our two recipients are first year teacher Natalie King at Del Rey Woods and second year teacher Elyse Etcheverry also at Del Rey Woods. Both of these teachers have chosen to use their money to up-date their "humble" classroom libraries with more non-fiction books to align with the new Common Core curriculum.
