I entered UC Santa Barbara in its third semester with 2200 other young folks living in marine barracks and a long bus ride into Santa Barbara for movies etc. Halfway through I left for a year in Honolulu to find myself and decided education would be a good fit after spending my Wednesday afternoons in a friend's fifth grade class at Punahou. After graduation I taught in Palos Verdes, married, and taught in Simi Valley with 50 second graders with no help for two years as new schools were built for the growing population. I went back to teaching after my daughter was born and moved to Santa Barbara staying, with time out for library school, until I was asked to come to Monterey to work in the newly developed library program. During this time, Amy and I were very fortunate to be able to travel to many interesting places. Thirty five years later, I'm sure glad I made the move!!

LEGISLATIVE TRAINING SESSION

The DKG Legislative Training Session was held in Sacramento on June 18-20. There were 31 attendees from Chi State. Leslie Geyer represented Delta Lambda. Leslie is also Health Committee Chair of Junior League's State Public Affairs Committee (SPAC). She had visited many of the legislators in Sacramento last May: Assembly Members Mark Stone, Luis Alejo, Joan Buchanan (Chair of Assembly Education Committee) and Senator Bill Monning. She also visited the Commission on the Status of Women with Geena Davis, the movie actress, as Chair. The group of three delegates from Santa Cruz, Hazel Powell, Linda Murphy, Jean Calvert, and Leslie decided to advocate mainly for CalSTRS's unfunded obligation.

Major talking points:

- *As a result of two major financial downturns in less than 10 years, CalSTRS has suffered significant investment losses
- *Based on the latest Actuarial, June 2012, the unfunded obligation is now greater than \$70 billion, with a ratio of 67% funding.
- *CalSTRS will run out of money in 2041 if nothing is done to correct this situation.
- *California, as the state sponsor, will be obligated to pay the difference between benefits paid and contributions received (pay as you go). If CalSTRS does run out of money the state will have to float bonds to fund the state pensions, and Moody's will downgrade the bonds.
- *The Legislature has the power to resolve this problem because CalSTRS contribution rates are set in statute.
- *Action should be taken now, not later, in order to provide a resolution that is less costly and more financially sound.
- *DKG Chi State supports swift legislative action to resolve the problem of CalSTRS unfunded liability.
- The Session also discussed Common Core Systems Implementation and the Long Term Care fee hikes.
- All agreed it was an excellent training session.

Love, Loss, and What I Wore, a play written by Nora Ephron (who also wrote Sleepless in Seattle, When Harry Met Sally, and other outstanding works) and her sister Delia Ephron, was on stage at the Carl Cherry Center in Carmel from June 7-30. The play is a bittersweet portrayal of events in women's lives as reflected by the clothing worn at the time. It played on Broadway for over three years.
