Doc Ricketts Lab Field Trip Recap

What better way to spend a typical, cloudy morning in Monterey, CA, than to tour the home and lab of Edward F. Ricketts, aka Doc Ricketts. That is what 7 intrepid DKG sisters accomplished.

We were greeted at the top of the staircase by our knowledgeable interpreter of the day, Sue Murphy, a good friend of mine. We seated ourselves inside what was once the living area of Ed Ricketts. We learned first his history in the house, then the history after his death in 1947. Here are a few fun facts!

He was called Doc by the kids of the time, but not the adults. He has been immortalized as Doc by John Steinbeck's book, Cannery Row.

He had two wives, and 3 children. Two of his children are still alive, located in Las Vegas, NV and Sitka, AL.

He was a poor businessman, and his business of collecting marine invertebrates, cats, and other critters, and shipping them for educational purposes never made him much money. He is one of the first scientists to point to the concept of biodiversity.

When the Lab was taken over eventually by a group of influential artists of the time, including Hank Ketcham and Morgan Stock, the idea for the Monterey Jazz Festival was conceived.



Legislation can change the curriculum you teach, address the teacher shortage, or eliminate Social Security penalties. California is facing a \$22.5 billion shortfall. Governor Newsom is requesting legislative leaders resist adding new programs or expanding existing programs, but legislators have already introduced legislation which can affect you. 
